VP promoted at West Valley Demonstration Project

Scott Anderson, the vice president and deputy general manager at the West Valley Demonstration Project, has been promoted to president and general manager, West Valley officials announced.

During Anderson's three-year tenure as deputy at the site in northern Cattaraugus County, he helped oversee the placement of 278 canisters of high-level radioactive waste placed into 56 storage casks and relocated to a concrete storage pad at the site. That work finished a year ahead of schedule, officials said.

Also, workers at the site shipped 180,000 cubic feet of low-level waste for disposal out West, deactivated a vitrification facility and demolished 22 of 47 buildings.

Anderson, who has 30 years' experience in hazardous and radioactive waste management, previously held senior management posts at Department of Energy sites in Oak Ridge, Tenn., and Idaho.
